From the Settlement Desk

The History of Christmas Cards: From Tradition to Crafting



Christmas cards have long been a cherished part of holiday traditions, sharing warm wishes and festive cheer. But how did this tradition begin? The story takes us back to Victorian England, where Sir Henry Cole and artist John Callcott Horsley brought the very first Christmas card to life.

In 1843, Cole, a civil servant and inventor, wanted to encourage the use of the new postal system and sought a way to send holiday greetings quickly and efficiently. Horsley illustrated a triptych design featuring a family enjoying a festive meal in the center, with scenes of charity on either side. Beneath it read the message, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to You." This first card sparked a movement that spread across Europe and beyond.

Fast-forward to 1915, when Joyce and Rollie Hall, founders of Hall Brothers (later Hallmark), revolutionized the Christmas card industry in the United States. They introduced folded cards and envelopes, departing from traditional postcards. This innovation made sending cards more personal, sparking the

massive popularity of the Hallmark brand and cementing Christmas cards as a cornerstone of holiday celebrations.

Today, the tradition of Christmas cards continues to connect loved ones across the globe, blending nostalgia with creativity. At the Pioneer Settlement, we honor this history by sharing it with visiting children during our **Holiday**

Traditions Field Trip.

Here, students step back in time to learn about the origins of Christmas cards and the craftsmanship behind them. They hear about the ingenuity of Horsley and Cole, and how the Hall Brothers brought new life to this tradition. Then, they create their own holiday-themed cards using lacing techniques, mimicking the hand-crafted aesthetic of a bygone era. These beautiful, festive cards double as unique decorations, ready to hang on trees or around the home.

This activity not only teaches the history of Christmas cards but also allows children to connect with the spirit of the season through art, imagination, and tradition. At the Pioneer Settlement, we're keeping this piece of holiday history alive, one handmade card at a time. 








In Memoriam



Benjamin "Tinker" Carl Rogers Jr., 78, of Reddick, Florida, passed away peacefully on October 23, 2024, surrounded by his loving family. Born in Nashville, Tennessee, to Dr. Carl Rogers and May Louise Williams Rogers, he grew up in Shelbyville, Tennessee, where he attended Columbia Military Academy and graduated from Shelbyville Central High School in 1966. He later earned a degree in Mechanical Drafting from Massey Technical Institute in Jacksonville, Florida, in 1968.

Tinker began his professional life as a draftsman while raising his family. In 1992, he fulfilled his dream of becoming a blacksmith, establishing Tinker's Forge in an original 1880s blacksmith shop in Irvine, Florida. For over three decades, he was a skilled craftsman, educator, and mentor, earning the title of Master blacksmith. He was an active member of the Florida Artist Blacksmith Association (FABA) and the Artist-Blacksmith's Association of North America (ABANA). His artistry can be found in museums, monasteries, casinos, and private collections, reflecting his dedication to the craft. Tinker often joked, "I never shoed a horse."

Beyond blacksmithing, Tinker enjoyed gardening, fishing, antique cars, and spending time with animals. He was a passionate advocate for the art of ornamental blacksmithing and a cherished mentor to many. His legacy lives on in his work and the countless lives he inspired.

Sweet Potato Pudding

6 Medium Sweet

3/4 c. brown sugar

potatoes

1/2 c. milk

2 beaten eggs

2/3 c. flour


1/4 lb. melted

1/4 c. orange juice

butter

1 tsp. vanilla

Boil and mash sweet potatoes. Add remaining ingredients, beating well. Put in buttered shallow baking dish. Place thin slices of orange on top. Bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees until slightly brown at edges.





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
